In my six summers working at WMU NC's Camp Mundo Vista, I became an expert at building campfires. I learned to arrange the small, dry tinder to catch the first sparks, to nurture and cultivate the tiny flame by slowly adding fuel, and to fan the flames to life before building a larger, sturdier structure to burn brightly while our campers roasted their marshmallows. Starting a fire was fun, but I also learned the joy of restarting a roaring bonfire from just a few embers of a flame that had all but died.

It turns out, WMU NC didn't just teach me how to fan real flames. My experiences in WMU NC have fanned into flame the gift of God that is in me and helped me to do the same for others.

This issue of *Tarheel Talk* explores churches and leaders in all phases of "fire-building." Some are gathering the kindling for missions in their churches by opening discussions about Missions Education programs (p.5). This church makes it their priority to reach unchurched children. In this group, more kids come to these mission programs that aren't members of the church, than are. And they are welcome. Many of their parents do not come to this church.

Why do these pictures make me so happy?

- They are celebrating the new church year in August. They are celebrating Christmas in August where we collect items needed by North American Mission Board Missionaries. The picture below is of David and Kathy Parsons, North American Mission Board missionaries receiving the school supplies the children brought. They will give the supplies to the multi-housing site where they have "God Loves You" clubs.
- 2. They are making it FUN! They had a Christian clown, fun circus food, relay games, and many cute decorations. They had props to dress themselves up as those working in a circus. They took many pictures and kids love to be in pictures!





- 3. The pastor is involved! He comes to their missions education classes each Wednesday night. If your pastor is unable to come because he is leading the church in a prayer meeting or a Bible study, that is okay; but it is a blessing that this pastor is faithful to get to know the kids and help with their activities.
- 4. All races of children and adults are here! They are welcome and treated equally. We must never turn anyone away from church because of their race, religion, or economic status. Jesus never turns anyone away.
- 5. They use WMU ideas and material from National WMU. They used the "Building on Faith" planning kit for the opening of the new church year. They had real toys and play toys around the room to remind them we must build up our faith.
- 6. They have lots of adults! In some churches, it is hard to get volunteers to serve, but they are blessed with many volunteers. Do not feel like you have to have this many to have a group. But I know each of them is blessed as they work with children.

Three-Legged Stools and Finding Our Voice



work with the two and threeyear-old class in our Sunday night programming at my church. I love this little group for so many reasons but especia lly because I can see their faith and cognitive development grow

by leaps and bounds simultaneously. So much of what we do follows a routine. We sing our "Welcome" puppet song, then the "Color Song" and finally our "Quiet Song" of prayer. I always cherish the moment when we sing the color song and I ask (for the umpteenth time), "Who made everything (in nature) with a color?" and they can finally answer "God!!". This connection and recognition usually happens around January each year. This past week, one of the four-year-olds in Children's Choir, began quietly singing one of our Easter Songs as we transitioned to Sunday School time. It was such a sweet little sound that I had never heard before over the louder "big kids". She had found her voice and felt safe to share it at church!


The early years of faith formation are so important. Did you know that by the age of four, children identify as churchgoers? How do I know? Well, because there have been numerous faith development studies on the topic, but also because when my girls were betw een the ages of three and four, they would shout "There's my church!" and get their hands dirty in the process. They can also tell you with great gusto that Jesus loves them. Missions Friends comes alongside and shows them that they can be BIG helpers by loving others and sharing Jesus' love just like missionaries are doing around the world. This is missions in its purest and simplest form. Missions Friends is not babysitting, it is important missional formation and faith foundation laying. It helps children to find their voice in missions.

In an article on the IMB website called "Your Church's Children Can (and Should) Be Involved in Missions", Taylor Johnson describes ministry as a three-legged stool. "The three legs represent worship, discipleship, and missions—the three big buckets of ministry. Most everything we do in our churches flows from one of these three ministry areas. In my experience as a children's minister, I've found that many children's ministries are successful in discipleship and maybe even worship, but oftentimes, missions seems to be the missing leg. And a two-legged stool won't stand on its own."

Children's Missions Education and opportunities are that critically important third leg and WMU does it so well. So perhaps conversations with our church leadership shouldn't start with, "Why aren't we doing Missions Friends or Children in Action?" but rather by asking the question, "Is our church trying to sit on a two-

as we drove by anytime during the week. Identifying themselves as churchgoers is critically important in faith development for children, and it is at these critical faith development ages that children are the perfect age for Missions Friends.

In the Prayer Quilt Ministry, WMU sewing members donate materials, time, and talents to sew and quilt prayer quilts with Bible verses on them and to pray for the critically ill recipients. To date, the members have made and given over 500 of the prayer quilts in the past ten years! The WMU has

recently honored two members for spearheading the effort: Peg Willis and Pat Dodson.

In December the WMU honored member Virginia Burgess whose family gave the land for Ranger Baptist Church back in 1938 and whose mother started WMU in the church in 1950. Virginia has remained active in WMU all her adult life teaching GAs and Acteens and serving in WMU office capacities. She recently retired from her role as WMU Treasurer. She helps with the Fall Annual Mission Bazaar where members sell sewn, crafted, and baked or canned goods, and 100% of proceeds go to the Lottie Moon Mission Offering. The WMU ladies, through this one-day event, raise over \$3,000 each year for the Lottie Moon Mission Offering. Last year the church, with under 100 regularly attending members, gave over \$22,000 to the Lottie Moon Mission Offering through donations and Mission Bazaar proceeds. Of course, having one of its own serve as a missionary with the International Mission Board with Central Asian People Group helps keep missions alive in the small, rural church.





The Dylan Jones Academy: *Empowering Futures through International Missions in Kenya*

The Dylan Jones Academy, established in 2017, is dedicated to transforming lives in Kambirwa, Kenya through education and empowerment.

In 2008, several members of Fairview Baptist Church in Statesville, NC traveled to Kenya on a visioning trip. In 2009, the church established a partnership with Muranga Mission Station, an organization that had been helping an IMB church plant from the mid-1950s engage the local Kambirwa community in Bible study and prayer. The goal of the partnership was a long-term relationship where holistic ministries would be developed to reach this rural African community with the gospel of Christ.

The first step was to establish a church building, as the people had been worshiping under a shade tree with about 12 people attending each week. This building allowed them to meet even when the weather was not suitable for outdoor worship. Today the church has about 200 people in attendance for their weekly worship gatherings on Sunday.

In 2017, the Dylan Jones Academy was established in response to the fact that many children in the Kambirwa area were not attending school due to financial hardship.

The vision of the academy is to break the cycle of generational poverty through

education. The Dylan Jones Academy focuses on providing a holistic learning experience. From primary to secondary education, the academy aims to equip students with the knowledge and skills needed to navigate life beyond the classroom.

As students receive quality education, they become catalysts for transformation within their communities, breaking the chains of poverty and inspiring future generations.

The Head Teacher states, "The Dylan Jones Academy is changing our community through these students. We have seen a significant decrease in domestic violence in the homes and our crime rate has decreased tremendously."

The Dylan Jones Academy is funded through individual donors and child sponsorships.

Financial support is crucial for the Dylan Jones Academy to maintain and enhance its educational programs. This support allows the academy to cover operational costs, invest in quality teaching resources, provide scholarships, and invest in two daily nutritious meals and annual health assessments for the students.

Unshakeable Hope: Holding On When Your Church or Small Group Faces Hardship



get phone calls and emails almost weekly from leaders who are discouraged about the state of their churches and WMU groups. Across the state we see churches that are struggling with attendance and retention, struggling to implement changes to church programming, and

struggling to reach new people. In fact, many churches are still trying to get back to the place they were before COVID, if they can get back to that place at all. .

I hear the discouragement in people's voices when they call and say to me, *"We have tried all we know to try. What can we do?"* And while we work together on coming up with practical steps they can take with their groups, more than anything I think those leaders need encouragement to keep going themselves.

Maybe today you are in a similar place. Your passion for missions, for loving people, and sharing the gospel is still very present, but current circumstances have hindered your hope. Let me encourage you with these reminders today:

- Your work for the Lord never goes to waste. Never. Not one thing you do for the Kingdom is wasted by Him.
- God sees how hard you are trying. He sees your
- heart and your desire to see others know Him.Growth can happen. Although not always in the way you think it will. Be open to the ways God may be working.
- Trust God in the process of this challenging time. He has a plan in it all.
- Relationships draw people in and keep them coming back. It doesn't have to reach hundreds of people for a ministry to matter.

• Struggles within a church or small group are not necessarily a sign to give up, but can be an invitation to grow and evolve.

It's easy to lose hope when we look at our current circumstances, but now is not the time to shrink back. Now is the time for hope. Unshakeable hope.

The Church, the Body of Christ, still has a purpose and a mission. There is work to be done for the Kingdom. I know as leaders you get discouraged at times. You may feel like what you do doesn't matter, that it's not worth it, or that at times it's too hard. But take heart.

God is still on the throne. He is still working and moving and using people like you to bring others to Him. He has a plan for you. He has a unique way for you to serve Him, and to make a Kingdom impact. He has plans for the Church, the Body of Christ to bring others to Him.

"This hope is a strong and trustworthy anchor for our souls. It leads us through the curtain into God's inner sanctuary" – Hebrews 6:19 (NLT)

> In times of great difficulty, hope is the beacon that guides us forward. It is our hope in Christ that helps us remain steadfast in times of great hardship and trials. It is our hope in Christ that helps us respond to people in love, to show kindness and mercy, and it is our hope in Christ that anchors us to Him at all times (Hebrews 6:19), no matter what life may throw our way.

Celebrating Deborah Taylor's Presidency By Allison Markwood

Deborah Taylor's heart for missions was shaped at a young age through her family and church in rural Mississippi. "My mom was the VBS person, Ms. Ella May led missions, and Ms. Nelly led Bible studies," Deborah reminisced.

Today, many (including this author) would name "Ms. Deborah" as one of the formative women who challenged, prepared, and equipped them for missions and ministry.

Deborah participated in GAs and Acteens and later received a WMU scholarship to attend seminary in New Orleans. WMU women prayed for her and encouraged her through her schooling. After graduating, Deborah went to work with the Georgia WMU, overseeing Mission Friends. In 1991, Deborah and her family moved to Charlotte, NC where she became an integral part of WMU and Acteens at University Hills

Baptist Church. She also quickly got connected with WMU NC on the state level, leading mission opportunities and trainings, and serving in numerous roles.

The whole time, God was preparing Deborah for a great and challenging calling: presiding over WMU NC through a pandemic and a time of long-awaited reconciliation.

A few weeks before the 2020 Missions Extravaganza Conference, COVID-19 shut down the whole world. Deborah Taylor was to be elected president during the conference. As part of the first-ever, virtual Executive Board Meeting that May, the Board appointed Deborah and the other 2020 officers to their positions, though they would not be "official" until the WMU body approved their election at the next conference.

Deborah came into office in a time of great uncertainty, which, while challenging, also provided growth opportunities for her and the organization. "I thought I was a prayer warrior, but I really dug deeper into prayer," Deborah reflected. "When there was a decision to be made and we didn't know what to do, we could come together in prayer." And God honored those prayers. WMU NC survived the pandemic, staying connected to members and hosting live-streamed conferences in 2021 and 2022. It has been thriving ever since. We've hired new staff, started new ministries, seen growth in giving, and tapped into creativity and innovation in multiple areas.

Also during Deborah's presidency, she and Executive Director/ Treasurer Amy Boone prayed together, developed meaningful relationships, sought wisdom from previous WMU leaders, and ultimately celebrated a unanimous Executive Board decision to move WMU NC offices back into the Baptist Building in 2022. While still an autonomous organization, WMU proudly partners with CBFNC and is "on mission together" with NC Baptists.

We are so grateful for what God has done through Deborah Taylor's leadership in the past four years, and we look forward to what He has in store for WMU NC in the future. May Deborah's vision for WMU become a reality and lead to more people hearing the Gospel:

"When people think of missions, I want them to think of WMU. I want their first thought to be, 'You know what? WMU knows missions.

'They're going to pray for you.

'They're going to support you.

'They're going to get you what you need.

'They're going to think long thoughts and train the next generation.' I want it to keep going for another 200 years!"

Keep Fanning the Flames of Missions



s I write my final assignment as President, my mind is racing with many reflections. I am so honored that you elected me to serve with our talented WMU NC staff and our faithful, multi-gifted officers and Executive Board. I treasure

the memories of meeting many of you fellow mission leaders across the state and seeing how God is using your churches to make a difference in the lives of people in your communities, as well as the state and world.

I have read many mission biographies and I always feel that my words are so inadequate compared to theirs. We always make sure that as we speak, we share WMU NC's mission statement—"to challenge, prepare, and equip Christian believers to be radically involved in the fulfillment of the Great Commission." Four years ago, God called me to accept this opportunity to serve while reading about Moses' call at the burning bush. I want to encourage you to use every opportunity God gives you to continue to fan the flames of missions in your family, church, community, and circles of influence.

"Fan the flames" means to intensify or stir up emotions. Other synonyms include **ignite**, **heighten**, **excite**, and **increase**. Fanning a flame provides more oxygen for a fire to react with and increases burning while blowing can cause the small flame to cool and not be able to continue burning. So it is with us as Christians—if we want others to come to faith in Christ, if we want there to be more missionaries serving unreached people groups, if we want the legacy of Fannie Heck and Sallie Bailey Jones to continue for WMU NC, then we must actively fan these flames of missions education, missions discipleship, training leaders, and showing compassion. Blowing on the small fire in front of us with words that lament how churches are different now, how people are not interested in serving, how much things cost, or how we have never done that before, then our fire will extinguish quickly. We must truly fan the flames with future thinking creativity, commitment, and encouragement as we seek to bring others to serve alongside us.

I have enjoyed sharing my stories of those who invested in me and the opportunities God has given me. I am thankful for those who truly have been my Aarons and Miriams to help me be the Moses leader for this time. I remind us all that the first step in fanning the flames of faith and missions is prayer. I am grateful for those who have supported and continue to support me in prayer. I join with you in praying for our missionaries and leaders and look forward to where God will lead WMU NC and those He will call to keep fanning the flames of faith and missions!


