

hen I was growing up, all I wanted was to be the next Lottie Moon. After college, circumstances led me to become a teacher, and I was actually upset that God put me in a high school classroom instead of sending me out to the nations.

One day a student asked me what my religion was. As I spoke the words "I'm a Christian," my eyes were opened, and for the first time, I truly saw my students. Kids from all around the world sat right in front of me, many of whom had never heard about Jesus. In that instant, I realized God had sent me to the nations without me even having to leave my hometown.

That humbling moment changed my life. I now try to remember that wherever I am is my mission field, and the people in my sphere of influence are the people to whom I must minister.

How can I invest in the people around me if I haven't taken the time to really see them? How can I know their needs if I haven't built relationships with them? How can I show them Jesus without them trusting I truly care for them?

Missions is so often dependent on building relationships. As you'll see in their articles, this theme has settled on the hearts of the WMU NC staff during this season. Read their experiences. Learn from their wisdom. Go out, ask deep questions, and build excellent relationships so you can let the truth and love of Jesus shine through you!

Give to missions.


Go on mission.

Are you living in Hope?



his past year I have looked at the many Scriptures with the word "hope" and studied more about the Hebrew and Greek use of the word. Dr. Wommack, a college professor in Colorado stated that "the word hope sometimes can seem less potent maybe than words like faith or love, but the

three work together like powerful dynamite, and it's as we live in love, and expect in hope that our faith can **ignite**."

One of the Hebrew definitions for the word hope is the image of a rope and it demonstrates how waiting on God and hoping in God are similar. The Psalms are full of this idea as David speaks about God and His words being his refuge and hope. I have spent much of my life needing that "rope" of God's hope to cling to and upon which to depend. We talk in our missional lifestyle of "holding the ropes in prayer" for missionaries and those sharing the gospel.

Much medical research has been done about the power of hope. One writer says, "You do not need to be well to hope, but you do need hope to be well." Our brains are programmed for good and suffer structural damage when we endure things like abuse and negativity. Dutch Sheets reminds us that "we are programmed by God to keep hoping even when life and our circumstances are opposite of what we're hoping for."

The Greek word for hope used in Hebrews 11:1 is "elpizo"— 'Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." It is defined as trust or an expectation. The Creator of all gave us an imagination that can expect something that is not there—yet! This aligns with Isaiah 26:3—The Passion translation says, "Perfect, absolute peace surrounds those whose (mind) imaginations are consumed with you; they confidently (hope) trust in you."

WMU NC wants to ignite you to live in hope—to cling to God's Words and to then "hold the ropes in prayer" for others. We want you to have the power of hope that overcomes circumstances and to help others in circumstances that might be damaging. We want you to join us in being confident in our hope in Christ so that we can imagine, dream, and implement ways to reach every tribe, nation, language, age, and culture with the gospel. Join us in missions education and discipleship, becoming a leader and mentoring others to be leaders, and sharing hope through our compassion ministries.

I recently shared with our Executive Board these words from Hudson Taylor, missionary to China before Lottie Moon: "Depend on it. God's work done in God's way will never lack God's supply. He is too wise a God to frustrate His purposes for lack of funds, and He can just as easily supply them ahead of time as afterward, and He much prefers doing so."

She loves to use her experiences alongside Scripture to discuss and teach how to thrive in spite of mental illness and that joy and sorrow can coexist. Julie and her husband Ryan have been married 16 years, have four children, and have served overseas in Canada, Mexico, Germany, and Turkey. Deeper Questions. Deeper Relationships.

Reaching the next generation can be a challenge, but it's also a crucial part of fulfilling the Great Commission. Each generation is a unique and complex demographic, with its own set of beliefs, values, and experiences. To connect with people from other generations and share the gospel with them, it's important to understand their perspective and ask the right questions.

Here are some of the best questions to ask to connect with people outside your generation:

- **1.** What are your passions and interests? Get to know people on a personal level and understand what drives them. You might also find common ground and earn trust.
- **2.** How do you see the world changing? Learn about others' views on current events and their hopes and fears for the future. This may open discussions about the role of faith in shaping the world.
- **3.** What are some of the biggest challenges you face in your life? Understanding people's struggles and how they are coping with them provides opportunities to offer support and encouragement.
- **4.** What do you believe is the purpose of life? This question can help you understand others' beliefs and values. It can also provide an opportunity to share your own faith and testimony.
- **5.** What are your thoughts on faith and spirituality? Take time to learn about people's past experiences with faith and how those experiences have shaped their beliefs. This makes a great introduction to sharing the gospel.
- **6.** What do you hope to accomplish in the future? Once you know where people are going, you can come alongside them to offer support, encouragement, mentorship, and an example of Christ's love.

By asking these questions, you can build meaningful relationships with people from other generations, understand their perspectives, and create opportunities for gospel conversations. So be bold, be faithful, and be intentional in reaching out to those around you. You may become the friend who introduces them to Jesus.

Being A Place Where People Belong



hen I was in seminary,
I worked as a church
planter for the Hispanic
population. I would drive around
the city of Richmond searching for
neighborhoods so we could begin
meeting those who lived around us.
During that time, I saw home Bible

studies start up, people get baptized, and a Pastor get hired, but what has stuck with me through the years was when one of the women asked me, "Why are you our friend?" Plenty of people had knocked on their doors wanting to talk with them about their faith, but I was the only one who attended their soccer games, ate dinners with them, helped their kids with homework, etc. I was the only one who wanted more than their conversion.

The church is failing Generation Z (those born between 1995-2010). We want their faithfulness and their belief but we are struggling to do and hear what they need. Gen Z is called the loneliest generation. Their mental health has been spiking in dangerous ways with suicide now the third leading cause of death for this age group. A survey done in 2022 shows Gen Z saying that they are more comfortable talking to strangers about their mental health than they are teachers, grandparents, or religious leaders.

Gen Z wants to talk about what is troubling them. They want to have deep conversations about the state of the world and they are worried about their futures. Agnosticism and atheism are their belief systems. The Gospel Coalition printed an article with interviews of Campus Ministers from across the nation that said they are having more success reaching Gen Z by offering them non-religious community than if they only offered evangelical programs. Gen Z needs God, and the church can point the way by offering relationships first. Offer them a place to come and build friendships and community. Gen Z will believe your actions more than your words, so show them that you love them regardless of their beliefs. Show them that you love the world by helping and making a difference in the community around you. Be a safe place for them to talk about their mental health struggles. Then, you can begin to have those evangelical conversations that can change their worlds. Be a place they belong.



Yes. WMU NC moved into the Baptist Building when it first opened in 1983. We were considered an auxiliary to the BSCNC and received a portion of the state missions offering to cover operational costs. Those arrangements ended in 2008 when WMU NC moved to an office in Raleigh.

No. WMU NC is a completely autonomous entity working alongside the BSCNC.
We do not receive any funds from the BSCNC or the state offering.

4. If you're not getting money from the BSCNC, where does your money come from?

WMU NC's funding comes from YOUR generous donations to the Heck-Jones Offering.

Ministry Spotlight: North Carolina Baptist Ministers' Wives

Whether outspoken or reserved, in the limelight or behind the scenes, your ministers' wives play an incredibly important role in the health and ministry of your church. To be a minister's wife is a unique and valuable calling that comes with its own joys and struggles. North Carolina Baptist Ministers' Wives ministry understands the needs of these special women and seeks to support them as they support their husbands and churches. This mission is carried out through a variety of means, including an annual retreat, a prayer ministry, and a strong community on Facebook.

The annual retreat is a highlight of the year for many ministers' wives. Held in July, this retreat provides an opportunity for women to come together and be encouraged, refreshed, and equipped for ministry. This year's retreat will be July 10-12 at Caraway Conference Center and will reflect on the question, "Where's Your Path Leading?" Jodi Aiken, a pastor's wife who has served alongside her husband in full-time ministry for over 20 years, will be the keynote speaker, and worship will be led by Leah Willis of Salem Baptist Church in Lincolnton.

North Carolina Baptist Ministers' Wives is also intentional in prayer. Ministers' wives can submit prayer requests online and know their requests will be lifted up by volunteers and leaders. This prayer ministry provides a powerful source of encouragement and support for women as they navigate the joys and challenges of ministry.

The organization's Facebook community provides a space for women to share prayer requests, praises, suggestions, and encouragement. Each week, the group admins post an engaging question tagged #TipTuesday. Members of the group answer the question, offering words of support and encouragement to one another and creating a strong sense of community among women who may be separated by geography but who share a common bond.

One of the strengths of the North Carolina Baptist Ministers' Wives ministry is its recognition of the unique challenges that ministers' wives face. These women juggle the demands of ministry with the responsibilities of family life, and they can sometimes feel isolated and overwhelmed. The ministry provides a safe and supportive community where women can share their struggles and find encouragement and support.

Seven Prayers for a Ministers' Wife

- **2. Her marriage:** Ministry is wonderful, and also demanding. Pray she would have a healthy, Godcentered marriage full of love and good communication.
- 3. Her children: Like it is for every mom, juggling work, ministry, and parenting is a challenge. Pray for her to have wisdom in parenting, the energy to balance her time, and grace for her kids and herself. Pray for her children's safety, health, and spiritual growth.
- **4. Her friendships:** Being a minister's wife can feel lonely, so pray that she would have deep and meaningful

- friendships with other women who can support and encourage her.
- 5. Her self-image: Pray that she finds her identity in what God says of her and not in what is assumed or expected of her.
- **6.** Her physical and emotional health: Ask God to give her energy, strength, peace of mind. and good health to fulfill His calling in her life.
- 7. Her ministry: Her first calling is to be a godly wife who points her husband to the gospel. Her ministry beyond that may be within the church or outside of it. Pray for ministers' wives to support their husbands well while having the courage to pursue their God-given callings.

Being an Unshakable Leader in a Shaky World

"My dear friends, stand firm and don't be shaken. Always keep busy working for the Lord. You know that everything you do for him is worthwhile." — 1 Corinthians 15:58 (CEV)



ur world seems to be changing with each passing day. Did you know that with the dawn of the technology and Internet era, we have experienced more growth in the last 30 years than we had in the previous 100 years? It seems like there is always some new

technology coming out or a new way to connect with people. We don't have to wait to read tragic headlines in the paper anymore because our phones notify us within moments of something happening.

Kids and youth today are facing tremendous stress and pressures that weren't there years ago, church programming is different, WMU's structure and resources are changing in a lot of ways, and many of our churches are facing hardship and the effects of an everchanging world and culture.

Our world can feel shaky at times, but we are called to stand firm and not be shaken, especially as leaders. So how do we remain steadfast? How can we be unshakable leaders in what feels like a very shaky world?

In order to be unshakable leaders, we must pursue God first and foremost. As leaders, if we want our ministries to produce fruit and for our lives to produce a rich faith, we must keep in constant pursuit of God. Where we place God on our list of priorities affects everything in our lives.

How connected we are to our Father shows. We will have a hard time leading others to have a close relationship with Jesus if we aren't seeking Him in prayer and communicating with Him ourselves. God is our unshakable foundation. It is essential that we seek Him first in all that we do.

Secondly, if we want to be unshakable leaders, we must step out of our comfort zones and embrace change. We are often creatures of comfort. We really don't like to be uncomfortable, and we don't like when things change or look different. We often don't like God asking us to do anything that pushes us too far out of our comfort zone. But pursuing God and being an unshakable leader means stepping out of your comfort zone!

It means serving in roles you may never have dreamed of. Working with people who are vastly different from you. Doing things you never thought you would do, and trusting that God will equip you for the assignment He has called you to do.

And we must embrace change, not run from it. I heard a pastor once say, "the past isn't really better, it's the anxiety of an unknown future that causes people to cling to it." We spend a lot of time focusing on the past because we are fearful of the changes that await us in the future.

Being an unshakable leader means that even when we face change, good or bad, we don't fear the future because our future rests in the hands of an all-knowing God. If our foundation is the steadfast love and pursuit of Jesus-the winds of change won't break us. Step out of your comfort zone, embrace change, and rest on the unchanging love of our Father.

And finally, if you want to be an unshakable leader, keep your focus on an unshakable God.

I know you feel weary at times. I know things can feel scary and everything seems to be changing, but I want to encourage you to stand firm. The truth is we may not always get to see the fruits of our labor, or the harvest from the seeds we plant, but God wastes nothing. And our work, the work we do for Him, to glorify Him, is never in vain.

You can be an unshakable leader because you love and serve an unshakable God. The world needs unshakable leaders of the faith right now. The world needs to see leaders who are passionate for seeing people come to know Christ and grow in their faith, and the world needs leaders who are relentless in their pursuit of God.

Remember, being an unshakable leader has little to do with who we are and everything to do with who Jesus is. Keep pursuing Him. Keep being on mission for Him. Remain steadfast in who He is. If you will unshakably pursue Him and stand firm, you will see Him do immeasurable things not only in you, but through you, and for generations to come.

Time to Circle Back



s an organization, WMU has created a legacy of missions support and education. I love that about us. Our WMU Heck-Jones offering is named in honor of Sallie Jones and Fannie Heck who were 16 and 24

respectively when they stepped up to WMU leadership. A BIG part of our legacy's beginning was young women who were completely passionate about missions. Women of WMU, to whom are you passing the torch? Who is hearing our story? Who is catching fire for missions in the next generation? As I travel around the state, I hear women say, "We have invited the young women but they don't seem interested." I would like to propose that they are interested in missions, but are you meeting them where they are in life? Ask yourself the following three questions to see if your group is setting itself up for success in "passing the torch."

Is your WMU an engaging group that is ACTIVELY doing missions?

Millennials and Gen Xers want to "do and experience." They don't expect to be entertained, but if your meetings are not engaging, they won't come back. Do you make your meeting a multisensory experience, or do you expect women to sit and receive? Most women never reach an age when they decide they'd rather not have fun or new experiences. If a younger woman would like an activity, chances are, everyone in your WMU will!

Are the majority of your missions projects collections or do you mix it up with "going and doing" or hands-on projects that can be accomplished within your meeting time? This might look like forgoing a speaker every few months to make time and space for hands-on projects. Check out the project ideas on the next page that can be done in an hour or less.

Is there a place for younger women to find support and belonging?

Every woman is more comfortable when surrounded by her peers. How then do we make room for young adults? Maybe it's time to break out of our comfort zones and circle back to how WMU was created. Circle back to circles of women meeting in one another's homes or small groups, and sharing life and a passion for missions. Meeting with a small group of one's peers might be less intimidating to young women than joining a large group, but this will only happen if we open our doors first. If you know two or more young women in your church who love missions, you have a MyMission group, they just don't know it yet. The young women of your church respect you. An invitation to your home carries weight. Good, important conversations take place when we break bread together in one another's homes and those conversations will keep them coming back; In fact, it's Biblical:

"They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. "Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

- Acts 2:45-47

Is the next generation worth the change?

Like it or not, childcare is an issue. If you want mothers in your group, you must consider how to make childcare work. Are you meeting at a time when childcare is available? Perhaps working young women can only meet Wednesday or Sunday nights when there is already children's programming. If your young women are leading and serving during children's programming, could you have a rotation of women who could cover for those who are leaders in children's programming so they can attend your current meeting? This would mean that the ladies in your group need to be willing to miss a meeting once or twice a year so that young leaders can attend. There are a lot of possibilities to make it work.

Change is hard, but remember that a cocoon must break apart for a newly transformed life to emerge. Are we willing to break down some of our traditional ways of doing things so a newly transformed WMU can emerge? Are you ready to be a WMU that can pass the torch?

MISSION PROJECT IDEAS FOR Over Hour or Legs



Make "Laundry Bags" to give to local refugees or women's safe houses, or just to pass out locally on a Saturday. Include a few laundry tablets, at least \$1.50 for a load of laundry, and a note telling the recipient of the love of Christ.



Make freezer-friendly meals in disposable pans for a family rescue mission, so families can have an easy meal to prepare in their new homes after transitioning out of the shelter's care. Divide the ingredient list amongst your group and make the meal during your meeting time. Include the heating instructions, a note with encouragement, an invitation to your church, and a message about Jesus' love for them.



Team up with the children in your church to help people experiencing trauma or stressful situations by making "You Are Loved" bags. You will need gallon-size ziplock bags, small stuffed animals, small coloring books or paper pads, and crayons, pens, or markers. Help children write a note for each bag. Instruct them to write the words "You are loved. God loves you!" and decorate each note.



Make teacher care bags with a "berry" theme. Put handsoap, sanitizer, cherry or strawberry lip balm, berry-flavored candy or gum, and a note saying how glad you are that God "picked" them to teach the children of your local school. Thank them for all that they do.



Make "thinking of you" cards for Meals on Wheels clients or shut-ins from your church. Remind recipients that God has not forgotten about them and neither has your WMU. Include an uplifting scripture with each card.

^{*}Remember, in order to be a true mission project, the Love of Christ must be shared, otherwise, you're doing something good, but not missional.
